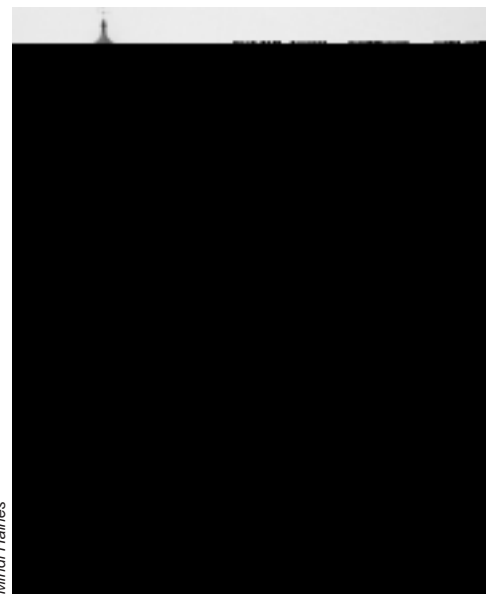
Study/travel enhances understanding of health care
